

## College Enrolment Notice 2026/2027-V1

This document is your Learning Agreement with the College. It states the main qualification(s) for which you are aiming and the planned learning hours. It is the College's aim to help you to succeed in your qualification(s). You must intend to complete the full qualification(s). If you want to update or remove any of the personal data you have provided you can make a request to do so by contacting [cishelpdesk@newdur.ac.uk](mailto:cishelpdesk@newdur.ac.uk) New College Durham is the Data Controller for the personal data you have supplied and our Data Protection Officer can be contacted by emailing [dataprotection@newdur.ac.uk](mailto:dataprotection@newdur.ac.uk). Most of the information collected at enrolment is required by us to deliver your course and to prove you are studying with us. To do this and to fulfil our contract with you we will share relevant information about you with our Funding Providers, Validating and Awarding Bodies, End Point Assessment organisations, sub-contracted service providers and with any of our partner institutions that are contracted to deliver your course(s). If we are asked by a local authority or school to confirm that you are studying with us we will only do so if we are required by law; for a task we or they are required to carry out in the public interest; if we know you have given consent; or in order to enable you to receive a benefit (e.g. Council Tax Benefit). In addition we may use recognised legitimate interests to share information for the purposes of safeguarding, law enforcement and crime prevention, public safety and in critical emergencies. We may also share your personal information with our Auditors to demonstrate our adherence to the law and good practice and we do this because it is a legal obligation of the College. We will retain data that is required by the College and our Funding Providers for 6 years after your course ends in order to administrate your enrolment contract with us. We will retain some data indefinitely as a permanent record to show who you are, when you attended the College, what your assessment marks were and what awards you achieved. This will help us to supply you with a reference or transcript if you request one as part of our public task and ultimately for archival purposes in the public interest. The College will use photographs or recordings in which you may feature for some marketing purposes. This will be done under the legal basis of 'Legitimate Interest'. If we collect other data from you in the course of your studies we will inform you why we have asked for it, what we will use it for, who we may pass it to and how long we intend to keep it for. This privacy notice is issued on behalf of the Secretary of State for the Department of Education (DfE) to inform learners about the Individualised Learner Record (ILR) and how their personal information is used in the ILR. Your personal information is used by the DfE to exercise our functions under article 6(1)(e) of the UK GDPR and to meet our statutory responsibilities, including under the Apprenticeships, Skills, Children and Learning Act 2009. Our lawful basis for using your special category personal data is covered under Substantial Public Interest based in law (Article 9(2)(g)) of UK GDPR legislation. This processing is under Section 54 of the Further and Higher Education Act (1992). The ILR collects data about learners and learning undertaken. Publicly funded colleges, training organisations, local authorities, and employers (FE providers) must collect and return the data each year under the terms of a funding agreement, contract or grant agreement. It helps ensure that public money is being spent in line with government targets. It is also used for education, training, employment, and well-being purposes, including research. We retain your ILR learner data for 20 years for operational purposes (e.g. to fund your learning and to publish official statistics). Your personal data is then retained in our research databases until you are aged 80 years so that it can be used for long-term research purposes.
